Dumas Wesley Community Center (DWCC) offers over a dozen programs and services for the working poor and the homeless in **Mobile, Alabama**. Neighborhood demographics document a predominately African-American minority district with an average annual family income of less than \$25,000. A majority of the neighborhood's households are led by single mothers who struggle to provide basic necessities for their families. Ninetynine percent of DWCC clientele live at or below the poverty level.







Transitional Housing

Sybil Smith Family Village (Mobile Campus) Baldwin Family Village (Baldwin County)

Dumas Wesley's transitional housing programs were founded to break the cycle of homelessness for women and children through supportive housing, case management, life skills, and behavior modification. Residents must be: homeless, 24 years of age or older, able to work or enroll in school, willing to live in a drug-and alcohol-free environment and participate in a case management plan.

IMPACT100 MOBILE GRANT RECIPIENT

In March, Dumas Wesley Community Center's transitional housing program, the Sybil Smith Family Village, was selected as Impact100 Mobile's 2024 grant recipient. The \$117,500 gift was used to renovate the program's 18 apartments located on Dumas Wesley's main campus in Mobile.



"Dumas Wesley's SAIL Program is important to me because as a senior citizen, the program has given me the ability to live a more healthy and independent life. For several years, Dumas Wesley has been there for me, helping to alleviate the stressors of life - especially living on a fixed income, with a heart condition. Every day, I enjoy the face-to-face conversations with the staff when they deliver my meal. They make sure that I'm doing okay. I look forward to seeing them pull up to my home. Human connection is so important because I live alone. The meals that I receive make a HUGE difference, too. They are nutritious, and I'm able to make my meals stretch throughout the week. Sometimes my pride gets in my way, and it's not easy to ask for help when I don't have enough money to buy things like toilet paper. Dumas Wesley makes it easy to ask. They have always been there for me - they are just a phone call away!"

Senior Activities for Independent Living Program

The Senior Activities for Independent Living (SAIL) Program offers daily enrichment to low-income seniors 60 and older. The Center provides local seniors with access to healthy meals, life skills classes, wellness education, exercise classes, recreation, and fellowship. Transportation is offered for SAIL participants to and from the Center, as well as to vital services such as the bank and pharmacy, local shopping, and health and wellness events. SAIL also delivers meals to homebound seniors five days a week.

Youth Programming

After School Achievement Program and Summer Recreation Program

The After School Achievement Program (ASAP) provides a variety of academic and character-building activities for underserved youth. Programming includes: tutoring, science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics (STEAM) workshops, career exploration, sports activities, a meal program and special "youth-empowered" events.

The Summer Recreation Program serves area children ages 6-15. The fun-filled summer includes a variety of educational field trips, academic enrichment, STEAM workshops, swimming, and a five-day trip to Camp Blue Lake in Andalusia, Alabama.
